Paul Lugard graduated in 1989 at the University of Groningen, The Netherlands and in 1990 at the College of Europe in Bruges, Belgium. In that same year, he joined the lawfirm of Trenité van Doorne in Rotterdam. Since 1994 he is employed at the Corporate Legal Department of Philips International B.V., Section Antitrust Law. In 2005 he became the Global Head of Antitrust of Royal Philips Electronics. In that capacity he is responsible for any antitrust and merger control matters involving Royal Philips Electronics.

Paul Lugard is a member of the board of the Dutch Association for Competition Law and regularly speaks about subjects of European and national antitrust law at conferences and seminars. He is a lecturer of competition law for in-house attorneys, as well as postgraduate students. He is a member of the editorial board of the leading Dutch magazine on competition law and regularly publishes in competition law journals, recently on intellectual property licensing and patent pools, non-horizontal mergers, the Article 81(3) Notice, exclusive dealing under Article 82 EC and resale price maintenance.

Paul represents Royal Philips Electronics in the European Round Table (ERT) and is the chair of the Commission for Competition of the Dutch Employers' Association VNO-NCW. Since 1995 he has been involved in a number of UNICE activities in the field of competition policy, and, more recently, in several BIAC and ICC initiatives. He has chaired the ICC Taskforce on Vertical and Conglomerate Mergers of the ICC Competition Commission. In 2006 Paul was appointed as Vice Chair of the ICC Competition Commission and in 2007 as Vice Chair of the Competition Committee of the Business and Industry Advisory Committee (BIAC) to the OECD. Since 2005 he participates in ICN meetings as a NGA member for the Dutch competition agency (NMa) and the EC Commission. In 2006 he testified at the US Department of Justice – Federal Trade Commission hearings on Section 2 Sherman Act.
